Applied Criminology

Criminology is the scientific study of crime, including its causes, responses by law enforcement, and methods of prevention.

Criminology will help students to gain an understanding of why people commit crime and the theories behind it.

You will study a range of topics:

- How crime reporting affects the public perception of criminality
- Campaigns for change relating to crime
- Theories and causes of criminality
- The process of criminal investigations and the prosecution of suspects
- Review criminal cases
- Understand the criminal justice system in **England & Wales**
- The role of punishment

Assessment

Units 1 and 3 are assessed by a controlled assessment.

Units 2 and 4 are assessed by a 90-minute written exam.
